





My three year Navy career was spent with the National Security Agency (NSA). I was at the Naval Security Group Hdqr on Nebraska Ave. in Washington, DC but was assigned to NSA. I later became a civilian Engineer with NSA and never changed desks. I was strongly discouraged from staying in the Reserves and I still regret that I did not continue in the Naval Reserves. While in the Navy, my military duty was JOOD once a month. The rest of the time I was an Electrical Engineer helping with the design/retrofit of US COMMUNICATIONS SECURITY equipment protecting US National and Military Communications. While in Washington, I ran into Ernie Roberts who was in the Naval Security Group which he stayed in till retirement. I also ran into Dick Adkins who was in the NROTC class of 59 who was assigned to NSA. My next 17 years I progressed through the organization, got an MSEE at Univ. of Maryland, (1965) went to the Industrial College of the Armed Forces (class of 75), and earned an MS in Administration in 1975 from George Washington Univ. I was involved in all US COMSEC equipment development for Diplomatic, Military and Space programs including the major upgrade for Fleet Broadcast. I had a great 20 years at NSA. In 1980, I took the job as Director, Electronic Engineering at NASA's Kennedy Space Center and managed all of the Ground Electronics, including the Launch Computer System and the upgrade of Launch Pad 39B. I was there for 7 years. After the Challenger Accident, I stayed long enough to verify that NONE OF MY SYSTEMS were responsible for the Accident and then retired from NASA. I worked in Industry in the Melbourne, FL area, taught Electrical Engineering Technology at the University of Central Florida for two years as an Visiting Assistant Professor, and finished my career with another Military Communications contractor.

Department of NAVAL SCIENCE

The NROTC is a source of regular and reserve officers for the U. S. Navy and Marine Corps. The NROTC student selects his field of study at the University, accompanied each semester by a course in Naval or Marine Science and a summer cruise program; upon graduation, he is commissioned as an Ensign or Second Lieutenant. If he desires, he may then enter into an aviation training program. NROTC classrooms, the rifle range, and a spacious armory are located in Hamilton College. The Compass and Chart Society sponsors the annual Commissioning Ball in honor of graduating students, as well as other extra-curricular activities. The NROTC rifle team, which has won national honors, forms the nucleus of the varsity rifle team, and intramural sports activity is encouraged.




Naval Science Department Has Amateur Radio Station

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NROTC Reunion May 13, 2010

CAPT Timothy E. Coolidge, USN

Captain Timothy E. Coolidge graduated from the University of Memphis with a Bachelor of Business Administration Degree. He was commissioned through Aviation Officer Candidate School in December 1982 and received his Wings of Gold in June 1984.

Captain Coolidge was one of the first newly winged ensigns to enter the Light Airborne Multi-Purpose System (LAMPS) Mk III program flying the SH-60B Seahawk. Assigned to the "Battlecats" of HSL-43 at North Island in 1985, he made the first operational deployment with Detachment One aboard USS Crommelin (FFG-37) with the Constellation Battle Group.

In 1988 Captain Coolidge was assigned as an Instructor Pilot with the "Seahawks" of HSL-41, the west coast LAMPS Mk III/SH-60B Fleet Replacement Squadron. He served as Tactics Curriculum Manager, Training Devices Officer, Operations Schedules Officer and NATOPS Instructor in addition to training SH-60B fleet replacement pilots.

Reporting to the "Scorpions" of HSL-49 in 1990, Captain Coolidge served as Maintenance Officer for Detachment Six onboard USS Chosin (CG-64) and as the Maintenance Department's Quality Assurance Officer. He completed his tour at HSL-49 as the Officer-in-Charge of Detachment Four onboard USS Shiloh (CG-67).

In February 1993 Captain Coolidge reported to the College of Naval Command and Staff at Newport, RI where he earned a Master of Arts Degree in National Security and Strategic Studies.

Captain Coolidge returned to HSL-49 in 1994 and deployed to the Western Pacific/Arabian Gulf as the Officer-in-Charge of Detachment Four aboard USS Merrill (DD-976) with the Lincoln Battle Group. Captain Coolidge completed his tour with HSL-49 as the Aircraft Maintenance Officer.

Captain Coolidge reported to the Office of the Assistant Secretary of the Navy (Manpower and Reserve Affairs) in June of 1997. As the Special Assistant for Naval Personnel, Captain Coolidge provided research, analysis, and recommendations for those Navy and Marine Corps personnel matters that required direct involvement of the Secretary of the Navy.

Captain Coolidge reported to Commander, Training Air Wing Four and the "Boomers" of VT-27 in December 1999. He served as VT-27's Executive Officer and Commanding Officer from March 2000 to August 2002. During his tour, VT-27's performance was recognized through receipt of the Training Excellence Award for best Primary Training Squadron, the Vice Admiral Robert Goldthwaite Award as the best Training Squadron in CNATRA, the Towers Award for Aviation Safety for the best Aviation Safety Program in CNATRA, and the squadron's seventh and eighth consecutive CNO Aviation Safety Awards.



In August 2002 Captain Coolidge reported to the Surface Warfare Directorate at OPNAV as the Warfare Systems Branch Head. He was responsible for requirements development and budget management for all Surface Warfare Anti-Submarine Warfare and Anti-Surface Warfare Weapons Systems and the research and development of the MH-60R Sea Hawk Multi-Mission Helicopter. In June 2005 Captain Coolidge assumed command of Naval Air Station Corpus Christi, Texas. He served as Commanding Officer through July 2008. Captain Coolidge has been awarded the Legion of Merit Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (with two Gold stars), Navy/Marine Corps Commendation Medal (with two Gold stars), the Navy/Marine Corps Achievement Medal and various campaign and service awards.

LIEUTENANT MICHAEL "CHAD" MARSH, USN

Lieutenant Marsh is a native of Marion, North Carolina. He enlisted in the United Sates Navy in 1995 and completed Boot Camp at Naval Station Great Lakes, Great Lakes, IL. He reported to Yeoman "A" School in Meridian, Mississippi in March 1996 and upon graduation, he reported to the Staff of Commander, Cruiser-Destroyer Group TWELVE in Mayport, Florida. While onboard CCDG-12 he made 2 Mediterranean Sea/Persian Gulf Deployments (onboard USS ENTERPRISE (CVN 65)) and 1 Counter-Narcotics Operations Deployment to South America (onboard USS GETTYSBURG (CG 64)). In July 2000, he transferred to the Naval Consolidated Brig Charleston, Charleston, South Carolina. While stationed at NAVCONBRIG Charleston he was selected for the FY 2000 Seaman-to-Admiral Program.

In July 2001 he reported to Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps Unit Jacksonville, Jacksonville Florida where he earned a Bachelors of Science in History with a Minor in Naval Science. Upon graduation, he was commissioned as an Ensign in the United States Naval Reserve.

LT Marsh's first officer assignment was to PRECOM UNIT JAMES E. WILLIAMS. In DEC 2004 the ship was commissioned and he served as the Machinery Division Officer (EM) until NOV 2005. He was then selected to "fleet up" through the Division Officer Sequencing Plan "A" to become the ship's Navigator where he amassed over 66,800 nautical miles traveled. While onboard USS JAMES E. WILLIAMS (DDG 95) he completed two Mediterranean Sea/ Persian Gulf/Horn of Africa deployments in support of the Global War on Terror and Anti-Piracy Operations.

He reported to the University of South Carolina, Reserve Officer Training Corps Unit in January of 2008 as an Instructor of Naval Science. Since his arrival at USC NROTC, LT Marsh has been selected to the FY 09 Navy Graduate Education Voucher Program and he is presently pursuing a Master's of Arts in Human Resource Management with a 3000 subspecialty code.

His military decorations include the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal (4), and various unit and expeditionary awards. Additionally, he is authorized to wear the Enlisted Surface Warfare Specialist, Enlisted Aviation Warfare Specialist and Surface Warfare Officer Breast insignias.

He is married to the former Ms. Crystal Leigh Stroud of Charlotte, North Carolina. They have three sons, Alexander (10), Gabriel (6) and Jackson (3).



He continued his flight training with the Air Force 562nd Flight Training Squadron Randolph Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas where he was designated Naval Flight Officer. For Fleet Replenishment (FRS) training Lieutenant Staley reported to Patrol Squadron THIRTY in Jacksonville, Florida for training on the P-3C Orion. After completion of FRS he reported to Patrol Squadron FIVE also in Jacksonville, Florida September 2006.

At Patrol Squadron FIVE Lieutenant Staley participated in three multi sight deployments to El Salvador for counter-drug operations; Mediterranean Patrols in support of the Global War on Terror out of Sicily, Spain, and Israel; and Anti-Piracy Operations in the Horn of Africa based out of Djibouti, Africa.
